Minutes of Wildflower Bunch Garden Club Meeting Big Canoe Clubhouse August 5, 2015

Welcome and Remarks

At 10:00 president Eunice Nichols welcomed members and guests. She announced that the new sound system had been installed, with this being our first time using it, and expressed hopes that all would go well with it. She remarked on our hot and humid, yet rain free "dog days of summer" with our wilted and thirsty plants as evidence, and our gardening efforts slowing down. Introduction of Crystal Merrell by Ed Straw

Crystal Merrell is a mother, herbalist, wildcrafter (a person who harvests plants from their wild habitat for food or medicinal purposes) and locavore (a person who endeavors to exclusively consume products grown within a 100 mile radius from where she lives). Working in harmony with the people, plants, animals, and ecosystem of local community is her passion. Born and raised in a small north Georgia town at the foothills of the Appalachians where her family has lived for generations, she began forming a connection with people of different walks that has lasted and expanded in adulthood. For over 9 years, she has been working with herbs. Crystal's official herbal studies began in 2008 at BotanoLogos School of Herbal Studies with Patricia Kyritsi Howell, where she returned as class assistant in 2010 and Clinical Training in 2011 with TCM (Traditional Chinese Medicine) assessment philosophy. In 2014, she began studies with Phyllis D. Light at Appalachian Center for Natural Health with emphasis on Southern Folk and Native American healing traditions. Crystal has studied with many recognized health teachers at conferences, workshops, and classes each year. As member of the American Herbalists Guild and the state chapter in Georgia (GHG), she works to maintain professional connections within a wider community of healers. She completed training in Mental Health First Aid in 2015. Her degrees include an A.S. in Natural Science and a B.S. in Mechanical Engineering.

Program

Highlights of Crystal's presentation included offering 3 samples of tea she'd made so we could analyze it for smell, taste, and feel, and then guess what plant it was made from. She talked about the beginnings of herbalism in India and its spread to Egypt, Greece and China. She introduced us to the work of several notable herbalists from the Appalachians. We learned that today's herbalist can be a grower, medicine maker, healer, medical herbalist, and/or folk herbalist who looks at the whole person, not just a single symptom or condition.
